

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

From My Shop by Phil Lawrence

Since we are starting a new year, what better way to begin than with an organized shop!



I think I could truthfully say that we all suffer from clutter in our shops. This month I'm going to give you some tips and ideas on how to organize some of that clutter. It's not only unsightly, it can be downright dangerous. Having to climb over clutter on the floor is a safety hazard. Piles of stuff, whether it's trash or treasure, on the floor or work bench can be a real source of frustration when you're looking for a part or tool. You don't have to ask me how I know! Yes folks, I confess, my shop is a disorganized mess, which needs a drastic transformation.

So here are some of my tips to getting organized:

Some shelves can be mounted on the walls to store most anything. I like this better than shelving units that sit on the floor using precious floor space.

Buy some plastic bins at the Dollar Store to put stuff in after you've separated and categorized your parts or supplies. Put labels on the bins and the bins on your shelves. That makes everything nice and neat, and easy to find.

Empty jars from the kitchen are good to save and reuse in the shop. Remove their original labels and you can easily see what's inside. You can mount them underneath wood shelves or you can put them on shallow shelves just wide enough to fit the jars. You can buy new canning jars at the hardware store in different sizes. Jars do occasionally break but they are easily replaced.

One of the grocery stores we used to shop at before we moved put their discarded cardboard boxes in a bin out front for the taking. There were always small boxes of the same size that were great for putting small stuff in. I used many of them to organize the drawers in my roll-around tool chest. Used Amazon shipping boxes are uniform sizes and are easy to label and can store larger items.

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Home improvement stores sell different size storage bins that are black with yellow snap-on lids. I'm sure you all have seen them. I have made good use of these for storing heavy car parts. They are easy to put labels on the lids and are stackable, taking up a minimum of floor space.

Small cabinets with plastic drawers can be purchased at hardware and home improvement stores and come in different sizes. They can be expensive, but are handy for small nuts, screws, washers and a multitude of other small items. Another plus with these units is that the drawers have moveable dividers and these cabinets can sit on top of your workbench or be mounted to a wall.

By mounting a sheet of pegboard to the wall above your bench you can mount a large amount of tools all clearly visible and easily reachable when you need them. The downside to this is that you have to buy the hooks or pegs to mount the tools on, which can get expensive. Also, to mount the pegboard you'll need to nail or screw narrow strips of wood to the studs as spacers for the peg board to allow a space for clearance to mount the hooks or pegs on the board. The pegs generally fit the board loose and can fall off the board when a tool is removed. Once your tool layout on the board is finalized you can put a dab of clear silicone on the peg or hook before inserting it in the pegboard, which should keep them in place.

Another way to mount tools above your bench would be to mount a 3/4" thick sheet of plywood and use finish nails to mount your tools. Spend a little more money, get a good grade of plywood with a nice finish and paint it the color of your choice. If you really want to get fancy, you can paint the outline of your tools on the board. By doing that, it makes a nice display board and you'll be able to spot a missing tool in a second. Use galvanized finish nails to mount your tools—they won't rust.

Another way to mount tools on a wall above your bench is to use magnetic strips. You can get these for a couple of dollars at Harbor Freight. You can buy magnetic socket holders for sockets and other tools. Buying these can also get expensive.

Large and small shelf brackets are used in my shop to hang larger parts on the wall. Using two large 12-or 14- inch shelf brackets enables me to hang three Model T frames together on the wall. Two smaller 4-inch brackets are good to mount a complete front axle assembly, wishbone included, neatly on the wall. I have also used these shelf brackets to hang wheels, rims, top bow assemblies, spare wishbones, front and rear spring assemblies, seat springs and a multitude of other parts on the walls of my shop and shed.

If you have spare engines laying on the floor in a corner, get some large furniture dollies. You can set a complete upright engine and transmission assembly inside the dolly frame. This way, you can easily roll it around. I have an eight-foot-long bench that I store two complete engines under easily and out of my way. The best part of storing them there is that they don't take up additional floor space and are easy to move when I clean under my bench.

Lastly, my most important tip is to have a place where everything in the shop can be neatly stored off the floor. When working on the car at the end of the day wipe your tools down and put everything you've used away, back where it belongs, even if you plan to continue the work the next day. Keep your tools and machines clean and in good working order so they are ready to use and can be found when you need them the next time.

I hope these tips on organizing your shop will be helpful. There's nothing worse than your wife or neighbors listening to you cussing and swearing because you can't remember where you last used your 9/16-inch wrench. I think we can, perhaps, all relate to that.

It's time for me to practice what I preach and do some more organizing out in the shop. You just never know, I might even find some treasures I didn't know I had!

I just thought of another tip: ask your wife is she would clean your shop, then go on a week-long trip by yourself. I guarantee that your shop WILL be clean on your return!
