A few comments from the MTFCA forum on our swap meet.

From what I saw I think you could have purchased enough parts to completely assemble a Model T and drive it away!

****** » As previously reported, the swap meet was moved from the grass to the pavement this year due to the grass being heavily damaged by a home show a few weeks ago. Despite that, this was a great swap meet for Model T and other pre-war stuff. Both buyer and seller attendance seemed to be high this year and I saw a lot of deals and interesting items. Glad to see a strong presence of early parts there.

********** » I was there all day! What a blast. My best moment was when in front of a group of really "young acting" guys, Robert Weitzel said " this is AdminJeff- he killed all those Russian Hackers on the forums". Yes, I did that but there's more to that story.... if you're reading this, we all lived through it. So no need to rehash all those lies and exaggerations here.... What a GREAT group of folks in Auburn and the Gold Country club here. John Saylor and his son and all the rest of these folks are generous to the nth degree with both their time and knowledge. Even Robert Weitzel's mom was here helping and selling cactuses.

I scored some serious deals at this swap meet, albeit I didn't party the night before so I could be there at the government's recommended daily allowance time of 5:30AM sharp! -- Ricardo high compression head -\$250 - thanks Nevada Bob! '23 rebuilt steering column 4:1 \$175 -Thanks John B! Cutouts \$2 Generator brush plates \$10, Misc signs -\$2 each. I think the Ford Service sign was the best bargain I got. Seriously it was \$2.

****** » It may have been a bit smaller than past years, but was really good I thought. Lots of Model T, some Model A and other early car parts were there. Many good deals I thought. I saw more brass era narrow nose pans at this meet than I have seen in one place in decades. I counted a dozen of them at least, and came home with two myself! Thank you Erik Barrett. I came home with one aluminum hogshead in terrible condition.let me have it for five. I think I can fix it up well enough to use... I got some wheel parts to complete a set of 21 inch wheels I am rebuilding, and a nice 30X3 front clincher rim. I took advantage of someone wanting to give away several fenders and side splash shields, included a pair of 1916 rear fenders in poor condition, but I can fix them. What made it even better, another long-time friend (Phil Lawrence, who posts on the forum sometimes) it turned out needed the brackets riveted inside the fender. I wanted to change the brackets to the '15 style, so he and I are both getting what we wanted from them! A couple of the other fenders, I did not need, but I DID need some hardware that was on them. That will be a win-win-win-win-wi! John Boorinakis got rid of some rusty junk he wanted gone, I got two rear fenders I wanted to fix up, I got some hardware I needed, and Phil L gets the brackets he needed. I got several other minor things I needed for my runabout.... There were a few cars for sale, several project cars available, and lots of good parts changing hands.

****** » ---at 9 am I asked about pie and was told only apple and peach left, so we had some crumble-apple pie--Lots of early stuff there, that was impressive. I bought a suitcase full of vacuum fuel units to make a good one for my '16 Dodge Bros. and a pair of fairly good '15/16 splash aprons for \$10--they need some work on the top, but the bottoms look good! Seemed like a smaller crowd, vendors and buyers, but lots of stuff sold; there were 4 rebuilt wood fellow wheels went for \$1K--looked like Stuzman's work, but no proof they were his. 12 miles away was an estate sale of T and A parts--lots of good stuff there too, and very reasonably priced. What amazed me was that at 1 pm there was still a very nice '26-27 gas tank for \$100 still there! Another great day...

We are selling the 1915 Model T roadster which was used on many of the Mother Lode Model T Club tours. Also his 1954 Studebaker Commander and three 10 gallon visible gas pumps. Below are descriptions of these items.

1915 Model T Roadster - \$14,000

This is a great car for touring with many enhancements including a twospeed Ruckstell differential with Rocky Mountain Brakes. Also a threespeed twin high, high-low type auxiliary transmission mounted ahead of the differential. The combination of Ruckstell and auxiliary transmission allow the car to creep in a parade at marching band speed without the need to stand on the low pedal and to handle virtually any touring conditions with little effort. The engine is a 1926 with an electric starter and generator. The radiator is "flat tube" for more efficient engine cooling. The car has two tail lights instead of only one and very good upholstery and top in excellent condition. This is an excellent touring car, not a show car. The cowl and tail lamp bezels are not brass. They were spray painted a brass color. There are some small dents in the rear fenders, probably caused by rocks thrown

from the tires.



1954 Studebaker Commander - \$23,000

This Studebaker Commander is an outstanding original car with original interior that is in excellent condition and a nice straight body. We believe that the paint is original. The odometer reads 63,500 miles. The 224 cu inch V8 engine is clean and well maintained. The generous engine power delivers comfortable highway cruising and the automatic transmission makes driving effortless. This car was featured on the cover of the Studebaker Club of America August 2017 Turning Wheels magazine. An aftermarket under dash air conditioner has been added for additional comfort in touring. However, it was installed in such a way that it can be easily removed to restore the car to its original configuration.

There are a few minor defects including the right rear tail light is cracked, some local cracking in the paint near the antenna and a paint defect or scratch near the door seam. The car is ready to drive and enjoy. (Continued next page) T Diggins' page 7

10 gallon Visible Gas Pumps (\$3,500 for pair with red crown globes and \$1000 for single pump with white crown globe)

There are three visible gas pumps available, two that are nearly a matched pair and the third that has a different main body shape. All of original Standard Oil milk glass globes. The matched pumps have red crown globes and the single pump has a white crown globe. The



red crown pumps are original; the white crown is original except for the metal wrapper which was fabricated by Jack.

Also we have several boxes of Model T parts, a front axle assembly, two steering columns and probably some other model T parts that possibly someone in the club might want and keep what they need and sell or pass on the rest.
